

THE ATYPICAL DAILY ROUTINE OF OUR MISSIONARIES

Your daily routine is quite different from that of our readers. May you describe it for us?

Our days resemble much those of the majority of the priests of our congregation. During the week, we have the common prayer four times a day in the chapel. The meals followed by a short time of recreation are also in common. Between these times of communal activity, we are either working in our offices or in the parlour hearing confessions and receiving such faithful as may wish to consult a priest on anything. The weekend sees us dispatched to our various outstations.

What makes our apostolate different, are the circumstances under which we have to carry it out. For example, by the time we come to the chapel for common prayer at 6:30 in the morning, we already have to contend with the heat and the humidity which have one freely transpiring in spite of being directly under the fans. As if that weren't enough, the morning meditation often turns into a mosquito hunt! They have the annoying tendency of sneaking under the cassock and biting one's ankles through the socks. It's often hard to study owing not only to the heat but also to the neighbouring 'pastor' who fills the whole neighbourhood with the noise of his "exorcisms" thanks to a P.A system worth even of a football stadium. Our being located in the city also assures that we have persons other than our faithful popping in for the occasional confession. This is always a good opportunity to introduce them to Tradition even though it be sometimes necessary to literally summarise the whole catechism in doing so.

How much of a challenge is it to have access to drinking water? Can the local diet prove a source of health problem for the western missionary?

Yes, water is a big problem for us. One can't only drink whisky! Unless of course SOS Africa were to bring in many more donations... We hope to solve the problem after the completion of the new Priory which has provision for a deep borehole (100 metres) and a system of mechanical and ultraviolet filters.

Our new cook, who knows his job quite well, takes care of us and we now have the joy of a decent menu, at least during the week. The difficulty will always be the weekend when we travel to the various chapels for apostolate. There will always be something to convalesce from during the week in the oasis of our future priory.

Living as close to your faithful is demanding, what have been the greatest obstacles you have had to surpass in the past five years? Are the local customs and traditions an obstacle to evangelisation?

The greatest obstacle is most certainly the language, more

so at the beginning. The cultural differences can also disorient one but as we learn to know our faithful, it suffices to analyse that which can be of use to them (for example their highly developed religious sense, their piety etc) and that which needs to be overcome (over-credulity which favours superstition, an overly acute business sense which often leads to a facility in lying.)

Most other difficulties are part and parcel of living in this country: poor infrastructure, which makes travelling tricky and even dangerous as well as the generalised insecurity. A lack of hygiene in the preparation of food often disturbs our "interior life."

SOS accompanies you in your daily activities, how are things taking form?

In a very real sense, the financial assistance coming from the association plays an essential role. The sheer extent of it is truly impressive especially in light of how it is all collected, but even that is not the essential.

Episode 1 of Michael's adventures in Nigeria



What the fathers see when traveling **\(\rightarrow\)**

"N'ebe ugwu, aga m aga n'ebe ugwu – Towards the North, I am going towards the North".

To the question laid to him by an old woman in the crowded bus, Michael answers that he is heading to the North. His mind, already beyond Abuja, slides on to Niger State behind Jos Plateau, traverses the Sahara to Lybia, floats across the Northern Sea, beyond Tripoli towards Europe. When he closes his eyes, Michael sees the green terrain, the teeming cities, the wealthy houses, the large chauffer-driven limos, the blue sky bathed in light. He must reach Europe, which lies to the North, if ever he is going to be able to offer his family a new life, far from misery, far from the palm grove.

Michael is 20 years old: His large determined forehead plunges into two large black eves that seem to overflow both with life and ardor. He was born in Aba, to the South. Together with his brothers and sisters, he works in a large plantation of palm trees kept to produce oil. Their meagre salaries are enough to place cassava on the table and allow for some paltry savings against darker days, which are carefully kept under their parents bed in their little baked-mud house. They are too poor even to dream. Robert, the eldest, has abandoned his studies in the city; his hands are not destined to cure men. The sky continues to be dark, grey and oppressive, as though the rain season should never end. Then one day, spurred on by the fire of his youth, Michael decided to leave for the North. "Father. since the sky has nothing to offer us, since the clouds wont disperse, I am going to Europe." His father therefore handed him the savings for darker days: "Go, son, go and find brighter days."

Thus did Michael leave n'ebe ugwu – for the North. "Ah, if only I was European." In the overloaded bus with a thousand cramped faces, a thousand mingled destinies, a thousand hopes pressed against the dirty windows, Michael allows his thoughts to precede him in his journey. "Ah, if only I was European, my parents, my brothers, my sisters: we would be rich and happy. Europeans don't realise the luck that God has given them"

"What are you saying young man?" The young man had thought out loud and an old woman had heard him. "Have you ever seen a European?" "No mother," he answers sheepishly. "Well, I have. I know two Frenchmen, two priests, they have come to establish a Mission in our country. They come here and yet you flee your country? Go to the north, you will see at Enugu, it's along your route... to the North"
